
2024 Senate Map

Most Top Tier Senate Races Involve Democrats Defending Seats

Arizona – Senator Kyrsten Sinema (I); Biden won by < 1% in 2020

Michigan – Open seat; Biden won by < 3% in 2020

Montana – Senator Jon Tester (D); Trump won by >16% in 2020; Tester won prior three races by 3.5%, 3.9%, 0.9% Nevada - Sen. Jacky Rosen (D); Biden won by < 3% in 2020

Ohio – Senator Sherrod Brown (D); Trump won by > 8% in 2020; Brown won prior three races by 6.8%, 5.2%, 12% Pennsylvania – Senator Bob Casey (D); Biden won by < 2% in 2020; Casey won prior three races by 13.1%, 8.9%, 18% Texas – Senator Ted Cruz (R) won by 2.5% in 2018 and likely faces stronger opponent in Representative Colin Allred (D) West Virginia – Senator Joe Manchin (D); Trump +39% in 2020; Manchin won prior three races by 3%, 24%, 10% Wisconsin – Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D); Biden won by < 1% in 2020; Baldwin won prior races by 10.8%, 5.6%,

Democrats are defending 23 seats, while Republicans are defending only 11 seats

2024 House Map Currently: Republicans 222 Democrats 213

The 5-seat margin is the closest since 1931-32. A 4-seat margin with the removal of Representative Santos (R-NY) would be the closest since 1849

- Cook Political Report rates 23 seats as Toss Ups 13 Republicans 10 Democrats. (10 R 12 D in June)
- Republicans hold 18 seats in districts carried by President Biden.
- DCCC has named 31 target seats, including 8 in California and 6 in New York.
- Republicans flipped 4 seats in New York that appear most vulnerable for Republicans.
- The Supreme Court in June reaffirmed a federal court order for Alabama to include two districts where Black voters make up voting-age majorities (vs. one currently). Louisiana could be next.



- Trump's team has worked behind the scenes to ensure delegate selection rules at the state level play to their favor California now winner take all not proportional, higher vote thresholds to claim any delegates, etc.

GOP Primary Outlook

- Trump leads DeSantis in the GOP presidential primaries by more than **35 points** in the FiveThirtyEight average, with Trump at 50.3 and DeSantis at 14.8.
- No nominee has erased that kind of gap since the 1970s, which is when the two parties moved away from deciding nominees at conventions and toward relying on primaries.
- In September of 2007, Hillary Clinton led Barack Obama 46 to 24 nationally.
- The Des Moines Register poll of October 3rd, 2007 showed Clinton at 29 over John Edwards and Barack Obama, at 23 and 22, respectively.

GOP Primary Outlook

The debate had minimal impact on the primary race.



But the money race still matters.

Impact of Indictments in GOP Primary

In the days before the Georgia indictment, Trump led DeSantis 38% to 20% in the Des Moines Register poll. In the days after, his lead over DeSantis stood at 43% to 18%.

Abortion Access and Swing State Dynamics

- Abortion access remains a key motivator. Since Roe was overturned, voters in seven states—a mix of both Red and Blue—have voted to protect choice at the ballot box.
- The GOP hasn't learned their lesson: just look at suburban & rural turnout in Ohio, Kansas, Michigan, and Montana. Meanwhile, Trump and every competitive GOP candidate remain committed to a national abortion ban... will swing voters tolerate it?

Third-Party Wildcard

Democrats fear third-party challengers threatening Biden's 2024 bid. Professor Cornel West has launched a Green Party bid, and a well-funded No Labels bid is widely viewed as helpful to Trump's reelection prospects.

No Labels has stated its intention to raise \$70 million to possibly place a third-party candidate on the ballot



Since late May, five surveys tested potential nominees for the No Labels ticket or West's Green Party candidacy. In each poll's head-to-head matchup, Biden either held a small lead over Trump or the two were tied. When pollsters added West or a hypothetical No Labels candidate, Trump gained slightly and usually took the lead.



The Misery Index (combination of the unemployment rate and inflation) is on the decline clocking in at 6.6%, which is lower than it was at the same point in the Obama, Clinton, & Reagan presidencies before their successful reelections.

Presidential Job Creation


Job Creation Per Month: Relevant Comparisons for Obama, Trump, & Biden

- Biden job creation averaging record 446k/month since inauguration, 302k/month since pre-pandemic peak jobs level regained in June '22
 - This is the fastest in # terms of any president since WW2
 - Second behind Carter in cumulative % increase at month 29 in office, going back to 1977
 - Fourth of 14 presidents back to Truman; all those with faster % gains were Democrats
- Obama 2nd term job creation faster than Trump, even pre-pandemic (2017 inauguration to jobs peak in Feb '20)

Impact of Criminal Trials in General Election

- In an August 16th AP/NORC poll, 47% of Independents and 16% of Republicans say Trump did something illegal with classified documents. 41% of Independents and 16% of Republicans say he did something illegal in Georgia regarding the 2020 election and 33% of Independents and 15% of Republicans say he did something illegal on January 6th.
- Trump won 94% of Republicans and 41% of Independents in 2020 and lost by 7 million votes. In 2016, his vote share among Republicans and Independents was 92% and 43%, respectively, and he lost by 2.9 million votes.

2024 Presidential Election Snapshot

• **Strong Economy, Unpopular President.** Despite the historically strong economy across multiple measures, Biden's approval remains underwater.

HOWEVER...

- **Unpopular Incumbent, More Unpopular Challenger.** Biden's negative net approval of 12.9 (41.5 favorable MINUS 54.4 unfavorable) is surpassed by Trump's negative net approval of 16.9 (39.7 favorable MINUS 56.5 unfavorable).
- This would mark a presidential matchup of historically low negative net approval ratings.
